General Comment: WHOLESALE TRADING TREND

Oranges continued to arrive in large numbers with bins in over-supply and eroding the carton and bag prices over the week past. Lemons remained slow and at the same rates as were grapefruit and mandarins. Imperial mandarins were in very light supply achieving less money as retailers pull them off their displays. Limes saw a continuing slowing of the market with an increase this week in supplies which has resulted in a fall in prices; however this may turn around in the coming weeks. The Sydney markets continued to see slow activity and after orders there was less passing trading as seen in past years.

NAVELS:

Demand: Slow Carryover: Some Quality: Good

Comment: The orange market was heavily supplied with bins of Navel oranges this week which included Washingtons, Lengs and Late Lane varieties. Carton and bag sales and prices were adversely affected and the market has weakened especially after Monday's orders. The bulk of fruit was of Class 1 quality, Washingtons in Class 1 15-kilo and 18-kilo cartons were priced from \$10-\$16 and some higher with a lot of fruit showing blemish and softening skins. Leng Navels in 15-kilo cartons were up to \$20 and the best Premium heaver packs to \$24 while Class 1 Late Lane Navels were from \$12-\$20 and some higher on Monday. Bulk Bins of Navel oranges ranged from \$60-\$120 and with most sales from \$80-\$100 for the bins. The 3-kilo net bags were from \$1.30-\$1.80 and mainly from \$1.40-\$1.80. Class 2 Navels were in large numbers and weakened to be from \$5-\$10. Red fleshed Cara Cara oranges were from \$10-\$15 and in very slow demand. There continued to be heavy supplies of Blood Oranges and the prices quoted were unchanged with Class 1 fruit from \$14-\$20 and the Premium South Australian fruit were up to \$24 while Class 2 fruit was from \$10-\$14 and were very slow.

GRAPEFRUIT:

Demand: Slow Carryover: Some Quality: Good

Comment: Both Red & White grapefruit continued to be slow selling this week with the market remaining very quiet and with slow sales and weak demand after orders. Pomelos were in lighter supply but continued to be slow selling with quality deteriorating. Class 1 Red grapefruit were priced from \$10-\$20 with Premium lines to \$24 while Class 1 White grapefruit were priced from \$8-\$16 and some higher. There were only green Pomelos sighted this week which ranged from \$2-\$4 per kilo.

LEMONS:

Demand: Good Carryover: Some Quality: Fair

The lemon market continued to be slow selling with good supplies and mixed quality as well as over-ripe fruit. Prices were generally unchanged having weakened substantially last week. Premium fruit were only up to \$30 on 18-kilo cartons and the bulk of the Class 1 and Composite eased slightly with good supplies and slowing demand. Class 1 15-kilo cartons were seen to range from \$12-\$24. Class 2 fruit was from \$10-\$14 while coastal fruit was in light supply and sold from \$12-\$20 and some higher.

LIMES:

Demand: Good Carryover: Light Quality: Mixed

Comment: The lime market continued to weaken and ranged from \$40-\$55 and Premiums to \$60 in 5-kilo trays for Class 1 fruit. Class 2 tray packed fruit were from \$15-\$40, while 10-kilo bulk packs ranged from \$20-\$40 for Class 2.

MANDARINS:

Demand: Fair Carryover: Moderate Quality: Fair

Comment: Southern Imperial mandarins continued to be in very light supply this week and the market has weakened over the past few weeks to now range from \$10-\$26, while better lines were up to \$30 on the best sizes. There were good supplies of Qld Murcot Honey mandarins which were steady for price. Imperial mandarins were in very light supply and were from \$10-\$26 on Class 1 fruit, with the best to \$30 while Class 2 fruit were from \$8-\$16. There were good supplies of very small Imperials from local Sydney growers this week past. There were also good supplies of Murcot Honey, Tangelos, southern Afourer mandarins and local Hicksons and Emperors. Tangelos ranged in price from \$14-\$20 and some higher for Class 1's with Class 2 fruit from \$5-\$14. Class 1 Murcot Honey in 15-kilo cartons ranged from \$20-\$30 and with some higher, while the Class 2 fruit were from \$12-\$20. Heavier 18-kilo packs of Premium quality Murcot were up to \$36 with Afourer mandarins at \$14-\$24 for Class 1 fruit in 9-kilo cartons. Hicksons in 9-kilo cartons were from \$10-\$20 and of generally good quality.

NAVEL:

SUPPLY: Steady DEMAND: Slow CARRYOVER: Some QUALITY: Good The market prices have stayed steady. Buyer demand was very poor and more than enough supply to meet this slow demand.

GRAPEFRUIT:

SUPPLY: Steady DEMAND: Slow CARRYOVER: Light QUALITY: Good

Grapefruit market was steady.

LEMONS:

SUPPLY: Steady DEMAND: Slow CARRYOVER: Some QUALITY: Good Poor buying demand and more than enough supply to meet this demand has left the market a bit weaker this week.

MANDARINS:

SUPPLY: Steady DEMAND: Slow CARRYOVER: Steady QUALITY: Good

Murcott mandarin prices were steady. There was slow buying demand and the appearance of more stonefruit over the coming weeks will not help. The upside is that more growers will also finish or reduce supply over the coming weeks.

LIMES:

SUPPLY: lighter DEMAND: Slow CARRYOVER: None QUALITY: Reasonable

Market prices were \$45 to \$60 per 5kg tray on the back of very light supply.
