General Comment: WHOLESALE TRADING TREND

The past weeks have seen a rapid drop in mandarin supplies and with higher prices being realised. While there was some resistance to the prices asked supplies have slowed and we saw better quality Imperials, Murcot Honey and Afourer mandarins selling well and clearing. The orange market has continued to flounder with poor demand, low prices and heavy supplies. Lemons were firmer for price due to the widespread rainfalls as well as a shortage of clean display quality fruit. Limes were steady with good quality fruit still sought after and old crop fruit was slow. Grapefruit were slow and unchanged.

#### **NAVELS:**

Demand: Slow Carryover: Some Quality: Good

Comment: There was little change to the Navel orange market this week with continuing heavy supplies of out of most of the southern districts and some Qld. fruit was also on offer. The market remained very slow for demand and prices were unchanged. Class 1, 15-kilo cartons of Navelina were priced from \$5-\$8 and were unwanted. Class 2 Navelina are almost unsalable from \$3-\$8. Class 1 15-kilo and 18-kilo cartons of Washingtons were priced from \$10-\$16 and some higher. One brand out of South Australia has continued to achieve a top of \$30. Leng Navels in 15-kilo cartons were up to \$20 and the best Premium heaver packs to \$24. Bulk Bins of Navel oranges ranged from \$50-\$100 and the best to \$150 in heavier wire bins, while 3-kilo net bags were from \$1.30-\$1.50. Red fleshed Cara Cara oranges were from \$10-\$16 and in very slow demand. There continued to be heavy supplies of Blood oranges which were unchanged from last week seeing Class 1 fruit from \$16-\$26 and the Premium South Australian fruit was up to \$30 and Class 2 fruit was from \$10-\$16.

### **GRAPEFRUIT:**

Demand: Slow Carryover: Light Quality: Good

**Comment** Both Red and White grapefruit continued to be slow selling this week. The selling market remained very quiet with slow sales, weak demand and no interest. Pomelos were in good supply and continued to be slow selling with quality issues and losses seen. Class 1 Red Grapefruit were priced from \$10-\$20 with Premium lines to \$24 while Class 1 White grapefruit were priced from \$8-\$16 and some higher. Pomelos ranged from \$2-\$3.50 with the best greens to \$4.

#### LEMONS:

Demand: Good Carryover: Some Quality: Fair

**Comment:** Lemons were in lighter supplies and the market firmed up on better quality fruit from Monday. Premium display fruit continued to be in light supply and was strongly priced. The bulk of the market was of fair to poor quality and has continued at the same rates this week. Class 1 15-kilo cartons were seen to range from \$14-\$26 and with the best to \$30 while 18-kilo cartons were asking up to \$38 this week. Class 2 fruit was selling from \$10-\$14. Coastal fruit was in light supply and sold from \$10-\$20.

#### LIMES:

Demand: Fair Carryover: Moderate Quality: Mixed

*Comment*: There was little change seen to the lime market this week with fair supplies of Class 2 and coloured fruit while demand and prices for green quality fruit was unchanged. Class 1 fruit was quoted from \$16-\$26 and the green waxed and stickered choice fruit in trays was up to \$30. Class 2 fruit sold from \$8-\$16, while 10-kilo bulk packs ranged from \$14-\$20 for Class 2s and up to \$30 in the bulk Class 1 cartons.

#### **MANDARINS:**

Demand: Good Carryover: Very Light Quality: Fair

Comment: Imperial mandarins were in very light supply this week past resulting in a price rise. Independent retail buyers were still looking for good quality fruit and the market was clearing at higher rates. Class 1 fruit ranged in price from \$20-\$30, Class 2 fruit was from \$10-\$20 and Premium lines of stickered row-faced fruit were from \$30-\$40. There were light supplies of Qld. Empress, Afourer & Murcot Honey mandarins on offer this week with the demand remaining good and the better quality fruit was clearing. There were also Tangelos from all districts and the tail end of the Queensland Hickson. Class 1 Empress in 18-kilo cartons were quoted from \$26-\$36 and the best sizes to \$40. Tangelos ranged in price from \$20-\$30 for Class 1 while Class 2s were from \$10-\$12. Class 1 Murcot Honey in 18-kilo cartons ranged from \$20-\$30 and the Class 2 were from \$16-\$20 and were clearing. Hickson mandarins were seen at \$16-\$24 for Class 1.

General Comment: WHOLESALE TRADING TREND

Market activity was a little more buoyant this week which was encouraging. Shortages of beans, zucchinis, rockmelons, honeydew melon and avocadoes are more obvious and prices increased accordingly. Citrus lines were generally in steady supply with the exception of mandarins which are now diminishing. There was more than enough supply of Navels for the demand. The sales range remained generally at \$14-\$25 for 1<sup>st</sup> grade fruit with some better quality size 56s up to \$30. Class 2 fruit was unchanged at \$8-\$12 with Nets at \$1.50-\$1.80 and some to \$2.00. The 300kg bins were still \$100-\$150 and the 400kg was around \$200. Trays of Easy Peel were in moderate supply and unchanged at \$20-\$30 and some up to \$35. Marsh and Ruby grapefruit remained steady in supply with the sales range generally between \$18-\$30 and some up to \$35 with Class 2 fruit at \$8-\$20. The supply of lemons was meeting demand and prices were steady at \$30-\$35 for sizes 88-113 and \$15-\$25 for sizes 125-150 with seconds at \$15-\$25. Limes were in moderate supply and prices were mainly in the \$20-\$30 range with a few to \$35. There were only limited supplies of Imperial mandarins and the sales range was a little tighter at \$18-\$30 for 1<sup>st</sup> grade and \$14-\$16 for seconds. The few Empress on offer were ranging between \$30-\$32 with a light supply of Afourer at \$28-\$30. Tangelos were increasing in supply and prices were a little softer at \$20-\$25 with some to \$30 and seconds at \$15-\$16.

**NAVELS:** There continued to be more than enough supply of Navels for the demand. The sales range remained generally at \$14 - \$25 for 1<sup>st</sup> grade fruit and size 56 of some good quality Lengs were up to \$30. No 2s continued at around \$8-\$12. Nets were unchanged at \$1.50-\$1.80 with some to \$2. The 300kg bins ranged between \$100-\$150 and the 400kg were around \$200. MOST SALES: \$20

**BLOOD ORANGE:** Steady supply and the selling range was unchanged at \$20-\$30.

CARA CARA: Cara Cara ranged between \$25-\$30 for Class 1 fruit and \$15-\$20 for seconds.

MARSH GRAPEFRUIT: Steady level of supply and the sales range continued from \$18-\$30

RUBY GRAPEFRUIT: Supply meeting demand and values continued between \$20 and \$35.

**LEMON:** Supply was steady and the price range remained stable at \$30-35 for Sizes 88-113 and \$20-\$30 for sizes 125-150 with seconds at \$15-25.

**MANDARINS:** A very limited supply of Imperials and the sales range was a little tighter at \$22-\$30 for sizes 56 through to 113 and \$15 and \$16 for sizes 48 with seconds and smalls at \$15-\$18. The few Empress on offer were ranging between \$30-\$32 and the light supply of Afourer were at \$28-\$30. Imperials were puffy and over mature having lost their appearance and taste.

**TANGELLOS:** Increased supply and values were softer. MOST SALES: Class 1 15kg \$20-\$25, Class 2 15kg \$15-\$16

LIMES: Moderate supply and prices were steady.

MOST SALES: \$20-\$30
