General Comment: WHOLESALE TRADING TREND

The market was well supplied with most of the summer fruits and citrus fruits have been steady on a slow market. Lemons weakened this week with increased numbers of imported USA fruit and southern fruit out of NSW, Victoria and South Australia. There were adequate supplies of Late Lane Navel oranges and the market was steady. Grapefruit were also steady with one line of imported Pomelos from Israel sighted. Limes were weaker this week.

NAVELS:

Demand: Slow Carryover: Some Quality: Good

Comment: There were adequate supplies of Late Lane Navel oranges this week and the market was steady for demand and prices. Class 1 Late Lane Navels were selling from \$10-\$24 and the odd higher. Bulk Bins of Navel oranges ranged from \$100-\$160. The 3-kilo net bags were priced from \$1.30-\$1.80 and mainly from \$1.40-\$1.70 and the best to \$1.80. Class 2 Navels were in large numbers and were from \$6-\$10 but mainly around \$8.

GRAPEFRUIT:

Demand: Slow Carryover: Some Quality: Good

Comment: Both Red and White grapefruit were steady this week with lighter supplies and prices were unchanged from last week on both the White and Reds.

Class 1 Red grapefruit were priced from \$10-\$24 with Premium lines to \$30.00 and Class 1 White grapefruit were priced from \$8-\$20.

LEMONS:

Demand: Good Carryover: Some Quality: Fair

Comment: The Lemon market continued to be mixed this past week with increased numbers of USA imports and larger numbers of mixed quality Southern district fruit from Australia. Imports from New Zealand were almost unsalable and were unwanted due to poor shelf life. The best quality fruit was out of Queensland along with some of the USA brands, while Southern fruit was very mixed and this market weakened on price due to quality issues. Southern fruit from NSW, Victoria and South Australia Class 1 15-kilo cartons eased this week to range from \$16-\$30. Class 1 18-kilo cartons from Far North Queensland were reported to be from \$35-\$60 while Imported USA cartons were from \$36-\$48.00 and Imported New Zealand fruit from \$24-\$30. Class 2 fruit was from \$12-\$20, Qld fruit from \$20-\$30 and coastal fruit was in light supply and sold from \$20 to \$30.

LIMES:

Demand: Fair Carryover: Light Quality: Mixed

Comment: Limes increased in numbers and with the Melbourne Cup forgotten demand and prices weakened this week to range with Class 1, 6-kilo trays from \$30-\$50 and with most sales around \$40. Class 2 tray packed fruit were from \$14-\$26, while 10-kilo bulk packs ranged from \$25-\$35 for Class 2 fruit.

General Comment: WHOLESALE TRADING TREND

There was no improvement in market activity this week and if anything, it was possibly a bit quieter than last week. There appeared to be increasing stock levels of most lines of fruit and vegetables and prices were generally easier. Citrus lines were in adequate supply to meet demand at steady prices with the only exception being limes which have eased almost daily. Ruby Grapefruit was in light supply and should lift in values by next week. Overseas imports of Ruby is possibly a week or two away.

NAVELS:

Comment: Supply continued to meet demand and values were unchanged. The sales range was generally between \$15 and \$25 and up to \$30 for sizes 56-64. Class 2 fruit remained at \$5 to \$10 and were slow to move. Net bags were \$2.20-\$2.50 while 300kg bulk bins were \$180 and \$250 for the 400kg.

MOST SALES: Class 1 \$15-\$25 with some to \$30, Class 2 \$5-\$10, 3kg net bags \$2.20-\$2.50, 300kg bulk bins \$180 and 400kg bulk bins \$250.

VALENCIA:

Comment: Valencias were in limited supply and ranged from \$15-\$20 while seconds were selling from \$10-\$12. Net bags remained at \$1.80-\$2.00.

MOST SALES \$15-\$20.

MARSH GRAPEFRUIT:

Comment: Supply continued to match demand and the sales range was unchanged between \$20 and \$25 with the odd sale to \$30. Most sales remained around the \$25 mark with seconds at \$10-\$15.

MOST SALES: \$25-\$30, Class 1 \$20-25 with the odd sale to \$30, Class 2 \$10-\$15 and 3kg net bags \$2.00-\$2.50.

RUBY GRAPEFRUIT:

Comment: Supply was lighter again this week but values are unchanged. The selling range continued at \$20 to \$25 with a few to \$30 with seconds at \$14-\$16 and some out to \$20. It is anticipated that values will lift next week.

MOST SALES: \$20-\$25, Class 1 \$20-\$25 and some to \$30, Class 2 \$12-\$20 and 3kg net bags \$2.00-\$2.50.

LEMONS:

Comment: Good quality lemons continued to be in short supply and prices were steady. The selling range remained at \$30-\$40 with some up to \$45. Sizes 88-113 ranged between \$40 and \$45 and sizes 125-150 were from \$30-\$40. Seconds were around \$20-\$25 and there was also a fair availability of fruit from the Yarra Valley which was mainly in the same price range of \$20-\$25. Some USA imports are now on the market at \$45-\$50 (sizes 95 & 115).

MOST SALES: Class 1 \$30-\$45 and Class 2 \$20-\$25

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Comment: Increased supply this week and values continued to ease as the week progressed. The sales range was \$40-\$50 with a few to \$60 and this looks like easing further next week.

MOST SALES: \$40-\$50, Class 1 Trays \$40-\$50 with a few to \$60.

MANDARINS:

Comment: Only a very limited supply of Murcotts remained on offer and values were steady. The sales range continued at \$50-\$55 for sizes 80-105 which were the only ones available. The season is now almost over.
